

The UAE has supplied 10 tonnes of aid to Italy, 13 tonnes of aid to Kazakhstan, and 10 tonnes of aid to Colombia in the fight against COVID-19. The shipments, which contained hundreds of thousands of pieces of personal protective equipment, will benefit over 30,000 healthcare workers across the three countries.

The UAE's Arabic remote learning platform

Madrasa is now serving 2.5 million people across the Arab world, three times more than before the COVID-19 crisis began. With over 5,000 educational videos on offer, the platform complements the UAE's distance learning initiative launched on March 22.

Etihad Airways will partner with Australian company Elenium Automation to test new technology that can detect sick travelers, including those with early symptoms of COVID-19. The system aims to track passengers' temperature, heart rate, and respiratory rate when passing through check-in desks, baggage drops, and security checkpoints.

Etihad announced it would add new flights from Abu Dhabi to Melbourne and Amsterdam to repatriate stranded passengers seeking to return home. Etihad continues to operate special flights to Seoul, Singapore, Manila, and Jakarta.

The UAE has now conducted almost 540,000 tests, approximately one for every 18 people in the country, and more than twice the number it had conducted at the beginning of the month. The UAE continues to conduct more testing per million people than any other country, roughly four times the next highest tester.
